## TASK 2: Watching video and answering questions

- 2. In what way did the visit of the British monarch George IV to Edinburgh in 1822 change the relationship between the English and Scots? (Which painter did capture the royal visit to Scotland on canvass?)
- 3. What role did Sir Walter Scott play in organising George IV's visit to Scotland in 1822?
- 4. Which song does the line "O ye'll tak' the high road, and I'll tak' the low (road)" come from? What is the central theme of the song?
- 5. What place did Queen Victoria choose to be her royal residence in the Highlands and how did she try to adapt the life at that place to suit the Highland cultural traditions?
- 6. Who was Queen Victoria's favourite painter? (What did the painter used to do and paint when he was up in Scotland?)
- 7. In which of his novels did Walter Scott affectionately depict the Loch Lomond?
- 8. Which event in Scotland's history is known as Glencoe Massacre and when did it happen?
