WILLIAM HOGARTH: KEY CONCEPTS & IDEAS

- specialised in painting narrative sequences of prints on a topical theme
- was influenced by Newton's theory of gravity
- considered by art historians as the first independent artist
- expressed in his visual art the disenfranchisement of the Protestant majority
- created a genuinely popular visual art form
- considered to be the founder of a tradition of subversion and dissent in British art
