- painted gentleman farmers and their families in their natural habitat
- produced landscape paintings featuring a lush, pastoral England
- chased in his paintings a perfect, completely desirable woman
- contributed to the notion that the artist's preoccupations are the proper subject of art
- raised the self-esteem of the British painter as an independent artist
- attempted to raise portraiture and landscape to the level of highest art

- to be full of delicate eros

- to have a melted, languorous look about oneself
- to celebrate a beautiful rather than crude sensuality
- to chase the creature of his dreams
- to please a more sophisticated clientele
- to buy oneself the services of a prostitute
- to give one's pictures a charge of muffled sexuality
- gorgeously dressed spirits of nature
- to conjure up the effects of dreaminess
- to build intricate little tabletop landscapes
- the shimmering, almost abstract quality of landscape paintings
- to impart the effect of beautiful vagueness to one's pictures
- pictures that defy the limitations of the portrait
- a disguised self-portrait
- a figure of a soldier pierced by the beauty around him
- a man helpless before a vision of a goddess
- to be transformed into a stag
- to be hunted down by one's own dogs
- to begin one's own fateful metamorphosis
